"She was sharper than people half her age," said longtime family friend David Muskal. "I think less than 20 years ago, she was skipping rope on the porch. At 97, she was spry as can be." Ms. Mallinger, of Squirrel Hill, was one of six siblings and had three children, five grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Ms. Mallinger stayed in good physical shape walking through her Squirrel Hill neighborhood, making conversation with the many people she considered friends. "You've never met a more vivacious 97-year-old," said Brian Schreiber, a member of Tree of Life. "She was just so full of life. "She had so much energy." She was a victim of the Pittsburgh synagogue shooting.
